

## **Bawtry's, 52 High Street**

Location – east side of High Street, on the north side of the junction of High Street and Wharf Street. Marked on Town Trail at #16. Grade II Listed.

A large three storey, three bay building dating to the late 18<sup>th</sup> century, built of brick with a pantile roof. It has a 20<sup>th</sup> century extension at the rear. A Directory of 1791 describes it as the Marquis of Granby – a coaching inn. It was subsequently known as The Granby Inn. In modern times, it was The Granby Hotel, which closed in 2008. Then, it was succesively called the Cooper and Griffin, and The Penny Farthing, and is now Bawtry's.

### **Historic England Listing Details**

Public house. Late C18, altered. Painted brick in Flemish bond, pantile roof. Three storeys, three bays (facing High Street) x one bay (facing Wharf Street). C20 pedimented doorcase flanked by C20 bowed casement windows, similar window on far right. First floor: Sixteen-pane sash to centre has projecting stone sill and flat brick arch; sashes with glazing bars to outer bays have similar sills and arches. Second floor: central ten-pane sash and outer eight-pane sashes with sills and arches as before. Dentilled eaves. Roof is hipped on right with large rebuilt brick stack between bays two and three; brick end stack to left end gable. Right return: C20 ground-floor window beneath windows as front bay three.

C20 additions to front left not of special interest.
