BAWTRY,

WITH THE VILLAGE OF ROSSINGTON AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

BAWTRY is a market town and chapelry, in that part of the parish of Blyth which is in the southern division of the wapentake of Strafforth and Tickhill, West Riding, 152 miles from London, 14 E. from Rotherham, 9 s. s. e. from Doncaster, between 4 & 5 w. from Tickhill, 36 N. from Nottingham, 9 N. w. from Retford, and 3 N. from Blyth; situated on the river Idle, which separates the counties of York and Nottingham, and near the Roman road leading from *Agelocum*, Littleborough, to *Danum*, Doncaster. The etymology of its name is doubtful, but generally ascribed to the Saxons, and said to be compounded of *Bar*, a boat, and *Try*, a receptacle or harbour for small vessels or boats. The principal trade of the place is derived from the Roche Abbey stone (much esteemed by statuary and architects,) which is transmitted by the Idle to Hull, and thence to London and other parts. In corn, and oak timber, a trade is maintained to a small extent, and that of a local nature is assisted by the situation of the town, which stands on the principal line of road between the Metropolis and Doncaster; by which means some good inns are supported. The river is navigable for craft of from twelve to twenty-four tons burden, by which means coal, groceries, and other commodities are supplied to the inhabitants. The magistrates for the West Riding hold petty sessions here for the district, and constables and other officers are appointed annually, at the court-leet.

held at Michaelmas, by the steward of the lady of the manor, the Dowager Viscountess Galway, whose seat is at Bawtry hall.

The places of worship are, the chapel dedicated to St. Nicholas, and one each for independents and Wesleyan methodists. The living of Bawtry is a curacy, in the gift of the vicar of Blyth. There is a small free school, in which about eight boys are taught. At Scrooby, one mile from the town, was a palace belonging to the Archbishop of York, in which Cardinal Wolsey for some time resided; the remains of the edifice have been converted into a farm house. The market is held on Thursday, and the fairs on Thursday in Whitsun week, and on old Martinmas day. The population of the chapelry in 1821 was 1,027, and in 1831, 1,149.

ROSSINGTON is a small village, in the parish of its name, in the Soke of Doncaster, about 5 miles s. by E. from that town, and 4 1/2 N. w. from Bawtry. In the cemetery of the parish church are several good monuments, and near the entrance to the choir, lie the remains of James Boswell, styled the King of the Gipsies, who died in January, 1708. Annual visits were formerly made by gipsies to his grave, who, amongst other ceremonies, used to pour a flagon of ale on it. The living of Rossington is a rectory, in the incumbency of the Rev. George Henry Bower. The parish contained, in 1831, 325 inhabitants.

BEDALE, AISKEW AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

BEDALE, a small neat built market town, in the
 parish of its name, which is partly in the eastern divi-
 sion of Hang wapentake, and partly in the wapentake
 of Halikeld, in the north riding, is 223 miles from
 London, 34 n. w. from York, 12 n. from Ripon, the
 like distance s. from Richmond, and 8 s. w. from
 Northallerton; situated on a little rivulet that dis-
 charges itself into the Swale, near Gaterby, and near
 to the Roman causeway, called *Leeming Lane*, leading
 from Richmond to Barbard Castle. The manufacture
 of lincens and carpets is carried on here to a limited
 extent. The neighbouring country is noted for its
 breed of hunting and road horses; and the town de-
 rives considerable advantage, and no trifling degree of
 consequence, from the many seats of the nobility in
 the immediate neighbourhood; amongst these may be
 enumerated Hornby castle, the seat of His Grace the
 Duke of Leeds; Newton house, His Grace the Duke
 Cleveland; Bedale hall, Admiral Beresford; Consta-
 ble Burton, Marmaduke Wyvill, Esq.; Thornton

hall, Sir Edward Dodsworth, Bart.; Thorpe Perrow,
 Mark Milbank, Esq. &c.

The places of worship are the parish church, and
 chapels for methodists, baptists, & Roman catholics.
 The church, which is dedicated to St. Gregory, is a
 large and venerable structure, with a square embattled
 tower, surmounted with pinnacles of great strength.
 Within the church are several interesting monuments:
 amongst which is one to the memory of Sir Brian
 Fitzalan, lord lieutenant of Scotland, in the reign of
 Edward I, who occupied a castle near the church, of
 which no traces remain. The living of Bedale is a
 rectory, in the gift alternately of Miss Peirse and
 Miles Stapleton, Esq., and incumbency of the Hon. &
 Rev. Thomas Monson. A free grammar school, of
 ancient foundation, is here; also two national schools,
 in which children of both sexes are instructed. The
 market day is Tuesday; the fairs are Easter Tuesday;
 Whit-Tuesday, and July 5th and 6th, for horned cat-
 tle, horses, sheep, leather and hardware; October
